Mission Together

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I have often heard people talk about the importance of doing mission in our own backyard. While this might often be seen as our local suburb, town or country, this edition of *Mission Together* focuses on our

regional backyard of Asia. In Acts 1:8, Jesus challenges His disciples to "tell people everywhere about me in Jerusalem, throughout Judea, in Samaria, and to the ends of the earth". Jesus' instruction is to go and share the Gospel beyond the area in which we currently live. A challenge to look towards other regions of the world, near and far, that need this same Good News. Asia is one of the near regions we work in as SIM Australia.

Asia is a region of the world that is worth considering for cross-cultural service. It has been described as the place where the future of global Christianity is being decided because the biggest population centres in the world are in this area. It is a region with less of a Christian heritage and every day many are being born into a context where Jesus is not known. Though there are many least reached communities in Asia, there are also places where Christianity is growing through missionaries, churches and house churches. For those who feel compelled to serve in Asia, you will be serving among relatively new churches and local believers. You will also be participating in what God is doing in this decisive moment of global Christianity in Asia.

Many Asian countries are predominantly collectivist cultures, where social ties are strong and individualism is deemphasised. We praise God that SIM mission workers are faithfully building relationship and community to sow seeds of the Gospel in people's hearts. As you will read about in this issue, God is bearing much fruit in the diverse ministries of our 28 faithful SIM Australia workers who serve in communities around this continent. SIM has been

sending mission workers to Asia since 1989, after our organisation merged with International Christian Fellowship (ICF). Since then, SIM mission workers have courageously obeyed the call of God on their life to serve with their unique giftings and skills in Asia.

SIM is a global mission and yet there is a strategic advantage in sending mission workers from Australia to this region, with its proximity to us and the large populations of various Asian countries here in Australia. What an opportunity we have to minister, in our big backyard, so that communities that don't yet know Jesus would have a chance to respond to Him.

So, a great question to ask is that if you are considering mission service, why not Asia? The testimonies of those already working with SIM in this region will show you the opportunities that exist for partnering with us to the population centre of the world. I pray you will be encouraged as you read how SIM is partnering with local churches to make Christ known in Asia.

In 1892, the Ceylon and India General Mission (CIGM) was founded, and a year after began work among Ceylon's Sinhalese Buddhists and Tamil Hindus. CIGM expanded from Ceylon into South India and eventually reached across the subcontinent and to the Philippines. CIGM would later merge with the Poona & Indian Village Mission (PIVM) to become the International Christian Fellowship (ICF). ICF merged with SIM in 1989 and since then, many mission workers have followed the call to serve in Asia to share the Gospel.

Jay and Robyn followed this call, serving with SIM in the Philippines for six-and-a-half years where they partnered with local workers to reach a minority religious group. The couple didn't sense the Lord directing them to Asia until the team at SIM USA asked them to prayerfully consider it. "It seemed like a good fit for us, so we sought the Lord and He opened the doors," said Jay.

As part of Jay and Robyn's preparation to serve in the Philippines, they engaged with resources and contacted local Filipino believers. He shared, "We started reading books about the Philippines and learning from other mission workers. That was helpful to a point. We also googled Filipino churches around my hometown and found a Filipino Christian church advertising Tagalog language learning. While they no longer offered these classes, they did open their arms to us and were overjoyed that we were going to serve in the Philippines."

Jay found taking the time to listen and learn, building relationships and building bonds of trust with local believers was crucial to adapting to the new culture after he arrived on the field. Jay's advice to someone considering serving God in Asia is, "Start building intentional relationships with people from the Asian country or neighbouring countries. Learn, listen and pray about what living like a disciple in that context might look like and how you could bear witness in that context."

Now in Australia and serving as a Regional Ministry Director (QLD), Jay mentors those preparing to serve in least reached communities in Asia and around the world. Preparing to serve cross-culturally is a journey that should be done in community. In partnership with local churches, SIM applicants receive discipleship, training and support from seasoned SIM mission workers.

SIM Australia's Across ministry also provides a platform for cross-cultural preparation within a team. Across facilitates mission workers within Australia to reach communities that are yet to hear the Gospel, such as migrants, refugees, and university students. A mission worker who is preparing to serve overseas will gain invaluable insights and experience by joining a local Across ministry that is outreaching to the culture they will serve in on the field. Robyn now serves with Across and uses her experience from the Philippines to serve migrants and refugees around Southeast Queensland.

SIMConnect (sim.org.au/simconnect), a bi-monthly missions meeting, also prepares our workers by providing missionminded Christians the opportunity to hear from our workers around the world, pray with others and interact on relevant topics in global mission. Mark & Nyomie were burdened to share the Gospel in Thailand and found a community at SIMConnect that encouraged them in obeying this call. Mark shared, "I have really appreciated the sense of encouragement and accountability that really comes from meeting together and praying about what God's doing around the world."

God has uniquely gifted each of us with skills that we can use to serve in His global mission. Business ministries mobilise entrepreneurs, professionals and tradespeople to the field so they can use their skills as a platform to share the Gospel with those they interact with.

More than just a platform to serve in creative access countries, the vision of SIM's Business Ministries is to see flourishing workers in sustainable business environments that are transforming communities where Christ is least known.

The four pillars of SIM's business ministries include Business as Mission (BAM), Professionals as Mission, Business for Church Planting and Micro-enterprise. The heart of the four pillars is to build strong connections with locals, support Gospel work and ultimately, see people come to know Jesus as their Lord and Saviour.

Some of the businesses within SIM include artisan handcrafts, language institutes, tourism, vocational training, business consulting, food processing, personal coaching and many more. In Asia, business ministry enables mission workers to develop an identity within the community, build trust with locals and integrate into the culture quickly.

Praise God, SIM mission workers in business ministries are serving least reached communities in 9 countries around Asia. Looking to the future of business ministries in this region, the Global Ministry Point Person for SIM's Business Ministries, JP Gradone, said, "Business Ministries opens up the opportunity for people who have always had a desire to serve God oversees, but only saw the possibility in the context of the traditional mission model. Business Ministries allows them to align their vocational skill set with the calling of God to the unreached in a holistic manner."

Two SIM Australia workers, who are serving in Asia, started an English teaching business where they have recently seen much fruit.


Stephen and Lucy

Stephen and Lucy* started teaching English to nationals and then pivoted to YouTube and running online classes during previous COVID-19 lockdowns. Since then, their business has flourished, and they are now running in-person classes at their home and corporate classes at various workplaces. The couple has enjoyed being able to build connections with professionals who are eager to learn English and open to discussing their faith. The couple looks forward to building up the business team, employing more staff and building deeper connections with those they encounter. Reflecting on what they have learnt about serving in business ministries, Stephen shared:

"We currently have the privilege of participating in a course about the theology of business. It's been such a blessing for us to reorient our hearts toward a God-focused perspective on money and business. The leader has been encouraging us to realise that business is just a tool that God has given us as a means to help lift burdens off people. The aim of a business isn't profit (though we must steward our resources towards profit so our businesses can continue to run and bless people). However, the aim is to seek to provide help and blessing to as many people as possible. And so, as we make some steps forward in our business, there is a real joy in thinking about how God might use these steps to bring more people blessing and to let them see something of Him."

Asia is home to 60.8% of the world's population (4.8 billion people)*. Around the continent of Asia, there are 2.8 billion people who are unreached with the Gospel.

Convinced that everyone needs to hear the Good News of Jesus, SIM has created a strategic initiative called 'Faithful Witness'. Faithful Witness is sending multi-cultural and multi-skilled teams of mission workers to make Jesus known in communities with little or no Christian witness and no access to the Gospel.

Praise God, across the world today there are 8 Faithful Witness teams with over 60 workers. Two of SIM's Faithful Witness teams are ministering to least reached communities in Asia, with one located in Thailand and the other in South Asia. Ayutthaya, the location of the Thailand team, has been identified by SIM as one of the least reached places in the country.

The historic city of Ayutthaya, which was once the capital of Thailand, is an important place for Thai Buddhism because of the ancient temples and royal palaces. On Buddhist holy days and national holidays, many Thai people visit Ayutthaya temples to make merit and seek blessing.

As well as building relationships in their day-to-day activities, the Faithful Witness team is reaching the community by teaching English at schools for free, running university outreach groups, organising a sports ministry, leading an outreach program at the local youth detention centre, hosting an art club, and building relationships through hospitality evangelism.

Aussie mission worker, Ruth, has been working with local believers in Ayutthaya to form connections and build trust with those they are reaching out to in their ministries. Ruth shared the story of one young girl who was greatly impacted by the care and compassion of the team.

Teaching English, sharing their Faith

'I teach English to a small group of teenagers who have left school to sell souvenirs to tourists and provide for their families. One girl, now 11, has been chasing tourists since she was 5. Her quardian sits under a nearby tree, watching her to make sure she pursues every potential customer.

A few weeks ago, when she was sitting and playing an English game with me, we heard her guardian's shrill voice shouting across the temple grounds at us, "Stop wasting your time learning that stuff, get over here and do your job." And that was that. No more study.

But the other day, just as we were leaving the temple, she ran over to put a piece of paper in my colleague's hand. "Don't read it until you've driven away," she said. Amongst her drawings, the paper read, "Why don't some people's parents love them?" "Why are some people even born?" and then, "Thank you for caring about me". She doesn't yet understand the love of Jesus, but she knows we are Christians. And she knows that God's people care for her when those who should, do not.' - Ruth

Get a glimpse of life in Ayutthaya!

In many countries in Asia, education is highly valued and one of the key ways seen to improve social status 'Young people face pressure from family expectations and society as they try to achieve competitive results. Those who are unable to receive a quality education, may end up having a lower social status and limited job opportunities in their communities. Two of our mission workers share their experience serving in student ministries in Asia.

ESL Teaching

Matt and his wife Alisa have been serving in Chiang Mai, Thailand since 2016. Matt is co-directing an outreach ministry called 'the Centre', where he teaches English to university students. The Centre partners with local churches to create a community where young people attend classes and activities. This provides the opportunity for life and faith to be shared as relationships are built.

Praying for where God would have them serve, Matt talked with SIM Thailand and heard about the ministry at the Centre. He said, "The Centre's approach of using English as a means of helping people, building relationships and opening up opportunities to share our faith with them really excited me. It brought into alignment some of my skills, gifts and passions. God confirmed this was the right move for us, so we set out to Chiang Mai with SIM."

Discipleship activities are very intentional at the Centre and Matt's heart is to see students come to know Jesus and follow Him with their lives. Matt shared, "We give opportunities for students to hear and respond to the Gospel through personal relationships and events that we have at the Centre. We endeavour to connect them with a local church community or cell group as soon as possible. As the Spirit continues to work in their lives, they are discipled through the local church and some of our staff. We then encourage them to be involved in serving in the Centre, the local church and the wider community."

It has been a blessing for Matt to see students he has connected with accept Jesus as their Lord and Saviour. However, sometimes the students move away before the team sees any fruit in their lives. "At this time, I feel sad that they weren't ready to commit to following Jesus yet and worry that they'll just drift away. But I know it's not up to me and God continues to work in their hearts wherever they may be. It has been encouraging to hear from some students years later that they are going to church or have made a commitment to follow Jesus. God is good!"

Matt is grateful that he can serve with his English teaching skills and be a part of the outreach and community at the Centre. To other teachers, Matt gave this encouragement, "There are so many ways to use teaching in the mission context wherever you are. It is a door opener. Pray that God will show you how you can use your gifts and passions to see the Kingdom grow."

Equipping university students

Recently, Matt and three teachers at the Centre took seven students on an outreach trip. The province they visited is 12 hours away and there are very few believers and churches in the area. During the trip, the team had the opportunity to run English classes and fun activities for kids in primary and high school over two days. Praise God that over 320 students attended.

Matt's teammates planted a church in this province recently, so the outreach team utilised their visit to open up more opportunities for the church to connect with the school and families in this district.

Matt and the group were also able to visit and pray for another ministry in the city centre that is working alongside a local church to perform outreach through a café and English teaching.

Matt shared, "It was amazing to see how God brought all the details of the trip together and seeing these university students (all at different stages in their faith journey), serving joyfully. Please continue to pray for God to grow the faith of the Centre students, for the kids from the school and their families, and for the growth of the church in this province."

Teaching at an International School

Families going overseas to serve a least reached community need a whole support system as they go.

Recognising and responding to this need, SIM founded and partnered with schools around the world to provide excellent, Christ-centred education for our missionary children. Over time, God opened doors for these schools to include children from the expatriate and local communities, including children whose parents are world leaders, business professionals, NGO workers, and embassy staff.

Tanya, who serves in Southeast Asia, teaches at an international school that mainly caters for children of missionaries. She is currently teaching a combination class of grade 1 and 2 students. By helping to provide quality education in places where our mission workers are serving, Tanya is helping our mission workers to stay longer on the field as the educational needs of their children are met.

Growing up as a missionary kid (MK) herself in Africa, Tanya felt God call her to work with missionary kids. As well as her skills as a teacher, Tanya remembers both the good and hard times she experienced as a child in a different culture and uses that to connect with her students. "I have always seen the need for teachers around the world to teach MKs and it just so happens that the two schools I have worked in so far have been in Asia," she shared.

Tanya's teaching highlight at her school is being able to incorporate her faith into the curriculum. "I love the daily interactions I have with the MKs I work with," Tanya explained. "They love being at school and are eager to learn. It is a privilege to not only be a part of their academic life but also their spiritual life. I get to teach my grade 1 and 2s a Bible study every day and I get to bring God into all my lessons where I see a connection to be made. This uninterrupted access to God in all lessons is amazing and for the students to see God in all things is amazing too."

Over the last few weeks, Tanya has had the privilege of witnessing a growth in confidence of one of her grade 1 students. "For lunch one day I sat down with the head of school, principal and business administrator and up came this grade 1 boy with his lunch. He smiled at the head of school, placed his food on the table and waited for the head of school to move over so he could fit. It was hilarious but also very touching to see this boy not care who he sat with. He then carried on a conversation with the four of us. I have seen him do this now a number of times and I just love seeing it!"

Serving as a teacher in missions since 2013 and witnessing many different seasons, Tanya leans on God to enable her in her ministry. She shared, "I keep persevering in working with MKs because God wants me to. I see the massive impact that not having teachers can have on mission workers deciding whether to remain in a country or not and so I want to do my part to make sure mission workers can keep doing what God has called them to do."

Even through the trials, Tanya finds her work very rewarding and is happy to help fill the need for teachers in schools. She said, "You have no idea how desperate MK schools are to have good teachers come to teach. The school I am currently at has many vacancies for the next school year and this will be a common story amongst most, if not all, MK schools worldwide."

Over ten years ago, Hope for Life Thailand (HFLT) began in Chiang Mai as a response to the HIV epidemic. Since then, this SIMaid project has worked with church partners to provide compassionate care to people living with and impacted by HIV, and prevention education to young people in northern Thailand to help break down social and cultural stigma about HIV.

Motivated by a desire to live out Christ's love and compassion, the team models and builds the capacity of others to provide holistic care to people and families through home visits, pastoral care, coaching and the provision of practical support.

In the past ten years, Thailand has continued to see great progress in access to HIV treatment and care. However, those living with HIV still often face stigma and discrimination. Eager to provide safe spaces for those they are reaching out to, the HFLT team also run activities including English classes, music classes, workshops and counselling with a focus on building authentic relationships.

A member of the HFLT team, Jacqui shared, "We have seen God so clearly work through relationships that we have developed and nurtured with people living with HIV and their families, and others impacted by issues of vulnerability and brokenness. Through these relationships, we demonstrate and speak into the value that each person has to us, and to God. The relationships provide a way to practically live out the radical grace of God to those who are often marginalised by families and communities."

A key focus of the HFLT team is to continue to build relationships that allow them to speak hope, healing and restoration into lives impacted by brokenness. One relationship that has greatly impacted the team over their years of ministry is their friendship with Fang.

Fang's Story

Fang was a young girl living in a rural village in northern Thailand. She had been born HIV positive, and her mother had passed away and she did not know her father. She was being raised by her aunt and uncle.

In her early teen years, Fang became very unwell. A small church in the community were aware of Fang's condition. They wanted to help but felt ill-equipped to show their love in a tangible way because they knew little about HIV and its associated risks. They were connected with the HFLT team who they invited to become involved.

The first time the HFLT team visited Fang, they sat on the veranda with her and the church pastor and his wife, and a local Christian. The team was relieved to hear that she had been to the doctor and was on the appropriate antiretroviral medication (the medicine for HIV). Fang was frail, only weighing 22kg. The team were thankful for the opportunity to encourage her and partner with the church to provide training and knowledge that would help them to support Fang and her family.

Within two months of the team's first visit, Fang's health sadly deteriorated further. She was bedridden, her heart was failing and she was fading in and out of consciousness. There were hospital visits and discussions with medical staff, but that wasn't what changed everything.

On one particular visit, Daeng, HFL Thailand's Project Director, knelt close to pray with Fang and when she opened her eyes and looked at Daeng, she called out, "Father." Fang, a fatherless child felt searched out and found by the love of her heavenly Father.

That was in July 2016. Within a week, Fang was eating and taking nutritional supplements – even able to walk again! Jacqui shared, "We saw her gain weight and gain energy and gain brightness. And as that happened, her character and her personality started to come out, too."



Six weeks later she sat and passed a school exam that enabled her to rejoin her classmates and attend school a few weeks later. She graduated from middle school and she was baptised. Over the following years, she thrived within her church and community, and was an amazing testimony of God's holistic transformation that is possible where there is love and hope.

Fang died of a brain infection related to HIV in early 2020. But the five extra years she was given as a result of God's radical grace, her local church and the HFLT team, allowed her to experience Jesus' transforming love and impact her community.

Bringing Restoration to Villages in Bangladesh

Bangladesh is battling an ongoing public health crisis.

In the 1970s, the Bangladeshi government received funding to drill millions of shallow tube wells in villages to supply clean drinking water to the people. In 1993¹, it was discovered the water from these wells contained dangerously high levels of naturally occurring arsenic from the soil. Although this happened decades ago, groundwater arsenic contamination continues to affect millions of people in Bangladesh.

SIMaid's Arsenic Alleviation & Awareness Program (AAAP) works to reduce suffering among impoverished communities in Bangladesh that are impacted by arsenic contamination. Motivated by the love of Christ, the project focuses on raising awareness, testing water quality in villages, providing subsidised water filters, and medical treatment for arsenicosis – the disease that forms when somebody ingests arseniccontaminated water over a long period. The project also works with Arsenicosis patients to improve household level kitchen gardening opportunities, helping patients grow nutrient rich vegetables which plays a key role in reversing the symptoms of chronic arsenic poisoning.

For over 20 years, the project has been bringing holistic transformation to communities so that people can drink water fit for life. Min is one woman who has been supported by the AAAP team.

Min's Story

Min is a young and otherwise healthy-looking woman, but her hands and feet are covered with dozens of rough spots and jagged bumps. This condition is keratosis, one of several outwardly visible signs of arsenic poisoning on the body. Min is just one of the many millions of people in Bangladesh affected by arsenic poisoning.

The effects of drinking contaminated water over a long time has impacted Min's ability to do many types of daily activities due to the pain and inconvenience the bumps have on her hands and feet.

Min found out about the cause of her condition when two AAAP workers visited her village. Awal, one of the workers, found her by going to each house in the village, showing photos of arsenicosis symptoms and asking if anyone knew someone who had similar symptoms.

Min and two other ladies were identified as having symptoms of arsenicosis. Awal informed the ladies that the AAAP team would arrange a mobile clinic to visit their village the following month. At the mobile clinic, the team provides a doctor and then covers 75% of the cost of any medicines the doctor prescribes to help the bodies fight to eliminate arsenic. The women listened carefully and were motivated to attend the clinic and take the treatments the doctor would prescribe.



Praise God, Min and the two other women were able to receive help from AAAP and visited the mobile clinic in their village. The women expressed their gratitude for the team's help and continual support in helping them learn about and access safe drinking water.

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
